Funding your postgraduate study

POSTGRADUATE STUDY IS MUCH MORE COMPETITIVE THAN UNDERGRADUATE STUDY. YOU SHOULD BE PREPARED TO RESEARCH THE DIFFERENT TYPES OF FUNDING AVAILABLE AND MEET ANY APPLICATION DEADLINES.

Postgraduate tuition fees 2017–18

When you accept your offer of a place, you also accept responsibility for paying your tuition fees, so it is vital that you have sufficient funds available. The annual tuition fee is set for a 12-month session, which usually runs from October to the end of September the following year. For doctoral research programmes that begin and/or end mid-session, fees are normally charged pro rata according to the number of months studied within a session. Living costs

We recommend on average a single student should secure a minimum level of funding equivalent to £175 per week in order to meet general living costs (accommodation, utilities, food, transport, study expenses, clothes and socialising).

UK Postgraduate loans

Borrowing money is a recognised option in terms of funding postgraduate study but it comes with conditions. **Always seek advice and think hard before taking out a loan.**

Postgraduate Student Loans

The maximum total loan amount an individual can borrow for a postgraduate taught Masters course is up to £10,000. This loan is intended to contribute towards the cost of pursuing postgraduate taught study on either a full-time or part-time programme. It is not intended to provide finances to cover all associated costs of study at this level. Interest is charged on the loan and repayments start once you are earning over £21,000. This will run concurrently with any previous loans provided by the Student Loan Company however course eligibility will vary.

NHS FUNDED AND TEACHER TRAINING

Those intending to study on a NHS funded or teacher training programme should apply for a tuition fee and maintenance loan via the undergraduate route.

Professional and Career Development Loans (PCDLs)

UK bank loans

Other high street banks may offer specialist loans to UK students, especially those wishing to study an MBA or Law. Personal loans, borrowing from family and friends, and extending overdraft limits could also be considered.

Postgraduate scholarships and grants

Scholarships from the University

Postgraduates can apply for scholarships and grants from a number of sources; some are centrally managed and others are offered directly through individual schools/departments. The majority offer help towards fees but some contribute towards living costs. Competition for these scholarships is based predominantly on academic performance and the number of scholarships offered varies annually.

Paid teaching and other University work

Postgraduate research students may apply for a teaching assistantship, enabling them to undertake a certain amount of teaching on an undergraduate programme. This provides another source of income and broadens academic horizons. Get in touch with your department for more information. Additional income can be generated by acting as a demonstrator, or by engaging in tutorial or marking work. Your programme tutor or research supervisor will be able to provide further details on these opportunities.

Research Council funding

THERE ARE SEVEN GOVERNMENT-FUNDED UK RESEARCH COUNCILS; TOGETHER THEY SUPPORT EXCELLENCE IN POSTGRADUATE TRAINING ACROSS ALL SUBJECT AREAS. SUPPORT INCLUDES FUNDING FOR DOCTORAL RESEARCH AND, IN SOME CASES, MASTERS-LEVEL STUDY.

Research Council awards are some of the most prestigious awards available in academia; therefore, competition is extremely fierce.

Awards are available to Home/EU residents, those with EU Migrant Worker status, and individuals deemed to have normal residence in the UK. Some Research Councils may fund overseas students in exceptional circumstances. Full Research Council awards cover the cost of tuition fees and provide a maintenance grant to support you during your study. Depending on your residency status and the Research Council you apply to, some EU students may be eligible for a fees-only award. The value of fees and maintenance grant support is defined by Research Councils UK and is published online at: www.rcuk.ac.uk

Standard Research Council awards provide three years of funding for a PhD, and one year's funding for an MA/MPhil/MRes. Awards are available on a full or part-time basis.

In addition to the basic maintenance grant and fees support, some Research Councils provide other opportunities for funded students, such as: a research training support grant; overseas institutional visits; overseas fieldwork; collaborative awards with industry and public sector partners; difficult language training; conference attendance, and work and research placements.



DOCTORAL RESEARCHER DATABASE

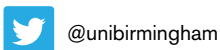
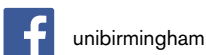
