UoB Virtual Campus

A new site allows users to take an interactive virtual tour of our stunning 250 acre Edgbaston campus, via photos, videos and 360 panoramas. The site will be used to help promote the campus to prospective students and as a 'virtual open day' for those unable to attend campus based events.

University strengthens its league table position

The University of Birmingham has been ranked 11th place in the Times Higher Education Student Experience Survey 2013, and 17th out of 124 UK universities in The Complete University Guide for 2014. These results further strengthen Birmingham's position as a top 20 university and reflect its recent performance in other highly regarded league tables, such as the Sunday Times University Guide 2013, which ranked the University in 13th place overall.

Birmingham summer tunnel closures

A new [website](#) has been launched to help commuters to plan ahead for closures of the A38 tunnels through the city centre this summer. The site provides an overview of the works, plus advice on suggested routes and alternative transport into the city centre. The St Chad's and Queensway tunnels will be completely closed to all traffic from 19 July to 2 September while essential refurbishment is carried out. The closure will be preceded by four weeks of overnight closures, from 10pm to 6am, and followed by up to two weeks of similar overnight closures.

Department of African Studies and Anthropology launches

The College of Arts and Law will be launching the Department of African Studies and Anthropology (DASA) for 2013–14. Incorporating the Centre of West African Studies (CWAS), DASA will formalise the long-established expansion of teaching, research and supervision beyond West Africa to include the entire African continent, and the growing place of Anthropology in staff expertise and teaching. CWAS, which celebrates 50 years in 2013, will continue as a centre within DASA to promote the development and dissemination of specifically West African-focused research.

Launching its pilot phase in May, [The Conversation UK](#) is an open access news and commentary website produced by academics and journalists. The website's team of editors will work with academics and the University press office to unlock expertise, apply it to topical issues, and make it available to the public. As a complementary media outlet, The Conversation offers an excellent platform for academics to showcase their research in a safe publishing environment, where articles are only published with the academic's approval. It will also give students access to extensive additional academic resources produced by their own lecturers and the wider research community. The UK version is a partnership with the original Melbourne-based [website](#), which in less than two years has become Australia's largest independent news, commentary and analysis website. New Open Access publication policy

A new policy on research papers is available on Open Access (OA) that aims to increase the impact of scholarly research by supporting access to peer-reviewed research findings. Publicly-funded work will be widely available, and the rights of authors properly acknowledged and cited. The policy applies to [peer-reviewed papers](#). Papers arising from research funded by the UK Funding Councils must be published in a compliant journal, acknowledge the funder in a standardised way, and include a statement on how underlying research materials can be accessed.
